My grandfather, who grew up in North Wales, was thrilled that I was learning the Welsh language—last fluently spoken in our family by *his* grandfather. Grandpa did once enroll in a Welsh course, but a bureaucratic mix-up meant that he found himself in an unsuitable advanced class. Still, he loved recounting the time he was mistaken for a native speaker when ordering his petrol in Welsh! I daresay this stemmed from his musicality, and his love of Welsh hymns.

My family is not the only one to have experienced a recent loss. Society member Rob Woods, husband of Laurie Jenkins and brother-in-law of Pegi Jenkins, Marilyn Jenkins and David Speck, sadly passed away on January 6.

Despite our sadness, and while we continue to tread cautiously because of the pandemic, we maintain our wonderful community spirit. As I said at our hybrid Service of Lessons and Carols, it is no coincidence that "gymdeithas," the Welsh word for "society," is also the Welsh word for "fellowship" (at least according to my Welsh-English dictionary!). It has been wonderful to get to know you, online and in person.

There is much to look forward to this year. Welsh learners will be pleased to find a dedicated dysgwyr section of the awr sgwrsio. Along with that, I am particularly excited about the return of our annual Saint David's Day luncheon on February 25, the Gymanfa ganu the following day, and our second Welsh Film Festival throughout March. There are so many people to thank for their work in organizing past and future events that I will not try to list them all. We are lucky to have so many members willing to help out. I look forward to seeing many of you in the coming months. In the meantime, I wish good health to you and yours this new year.

Colofn y Dysgwyr

The *dosbarth Cymraeg* continues to evolve and is now planning to meet once a month for language and grammar instruction and practice. The group is still welcome to join the Welsh speakers for conversation. See notice following.

This issue we will focus on the long form of the past tense.

Use gwneud in past tense as an auxiliary verb and use the infinitive of the verb. The infinitives take the soft mutation.

Note that most Welsh speakers would drop the initial "g" in speech, at least. For simplicity, we will use the spoken version.

Examples:

- (G)wnes i + gweld ->Wnes i weld = I saw
- (G)wnest ti + symud -> Wnest ti symud = you moved (singular)
- (G)wnaeth e/o + rhedeg -> Wnaeth o redeg = he ran
- (G)wnaeth hi + dawnsio -> Wnaeth hi ddawnsio = she danced
- (G)wnaethon ni + cerdded -> Wnaethon ni <u>gerdded = We</u> walked
- (G)wnaethoch chi +cysgu -> Wnaethoch chi gysgu = You slept (plural or formal)
- (G)wnaethon nhw + canu -> Wnaethon nhw ganu = They sang

After having been cancelled at the very last minute in 2020 and then a lengthy 'pandemic' break, plans are well in hand for the Ontario Welsh Festival for 2023. It will be held at the downtown Hilton Garden Inn and the concert and Gymanfa will take place at Christ Church Cathedral, just a few minutes' walk from the hotel.

We will share a friendly brunch at the hotel on Sunday morning, before walking to the cathedral for the highlight of the weekend, the Gymanfa, with Alan Thomas at the organ. It will start at 12.30 p.m.

Registration for the Festival will begin at the end of January-check out our website then.

OTTAWA WELSH MOVIE FESTIVAL

March 2023

The Ottawa Welsh Society is very pleased and proud to announce our second film festival, which will take place at the Bytowne Cinema on four consecutive Monday evenings in March 2023, starting on Monday, March 6. The showings are scheduled to start at approximately 6:45 pm. We have a fascinating and varied lineup of films for you.

March 6: Mr. Jones In English. 2019.

Directed by Academy Award winner Agnieszka Holland, and starring James Norton of *Granchester* fame, this harrowing tale recounts the story of the Welsh journalist Gareth Jones who was posted in Moscow during the Stalin era, and travelled to Ukraine against all advice and regulations to investigate the rumours of the famine.

The year was 1933, and Stalin's policy of collectivization led to the man-made famine that killed millions of Ukrainians - the Holodomor. Jones's attempts to inform the Western world of these tragedies were thwarted by the conventional press, notably Walter Duranty of the New York Times. But, on his return to Britain, and against much opposition, Jones managed to get his story taken seriously.

March 13: Patagonia In Welsh and Spanish, with English subtitles. 2010.

This Welsh-Argentinian drama was filmed in the glorious scenery of Patagonia, Southern Argentina. It was the British entry for Best Foreign Film at the Academy Awards of 2012.

The film tells two parallel stories – one of young Welsh couple Gwen and Rhys (Nia Roberts and Matthew Gravelle) who travel to Patagonia where Rhys is commissioned to photograph the Welsh churches in the area, and meet local guide Mateo (Matthew Rhys). Simultaneously, Cerys (Marta Lubos), an elderly Welsh Argentinean woman decides to travel to Wales to search for her roots.

March 20: Morfydd In Welsh, with English subtitles. 2018.

Morfydd Llwyn-Owen (1891-1918) was a prolific Welsh composer, pianist and mezzo soprano. Having graduated from university in Cardiff, she was accepted at the Royal Academy of Music, and while in London was a member of several influential intellectual circles. The film is a sweeping tale of her musical and personal life, and her eventual tragic death at age 27.

March 27: *American Interior* In English and Welsh, with subtitles. 2018

This quirky film follows Gruff Rhys of the Welsh rock group Super Furry Animals as he traces the route of his 18th century ancestor, John Evans, across the great plains of the United States of America. Evans was searching for a lost tribe of Welsh speaking Indigenous Americans – the Madogwys. It will take you by surprise!
